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# About the Club

## Aims of the Club

7. **Preventing pollution and protecting wildlife by removing rubbish**
8. **Taking care when boating and anchoring to avoid damage to wildlife and habitat**
9. **Using established roads and tracks**
10. **Reporting environmental damage**
11. **Avoiding unnecessary interactions with wildlife species and their habitats**
12. **Practising courtesy towards all those who use inland and coastal waters**
13. **Obtaining permission from landholders and traditional owners before entering their land**
14. **Caring for our own safety and the safety of others when fishing**

# Recorder's Report

Welcome to the start of the 2012-13 fishing year.

With the new year comes a new ANSA rule book – the changes most likely to impact on us are updates to fighting factors for a number of species (Carp, Morwong, Gummy Shark, School Shark and Tench go from 0.8 to 1 and Sweep go from 1 to 1.5) and the inclusion of 1kg and 2kg line in the Handline division.

The first captures for the year were made by Anthony Heiser fishing Eucumbene for cracker Rainbow Trout and Kyle Walton fishing Burrinjuck for an early start to the new Carp length-based competition: 8 Carp averaging over 45cm long. Well done Kyle!

We have already had the first Club outing for the year. Like last year, the Kioloa outing experienced awful weather, with members fishing hard for Australian Salmon to about a kilo on the beach and bait (Slimy Mackerel) in Jervis Bay. Chris Head caught the stand-out Salmon on the beach at 1.6kg, while I managed to shake the Recorder's curse and score a tank full of nice Slimies, but then got pounded by the chop trying to get across Jervis Bay.

The next Club outing will be to Buckenderra (Lake Eucumbene) and should be a good one – last year we caught a few Brown Trout between 1kg and 2kg and heaps of just-legal Rainbows. I hope you can make it.

Keep safe on the water and keep the capture forms rolling in.

## The battle of Beach versus Bluewater!

July two years ago, a contingent of CFC members travelled to Wairo Beach Tourist Park and enjoyed magnificent captures of kingfish and bonito (some bonito are still on Brian's boat I hear) on the Saturday followed by equally sensational beach fishing on the Sunday. Last year, the contingent returned to Wairo Beach Tourist Park hoping for more kingies, bonito and salmon. Instead, the weather was crap, Glen and Karen Malam didn't even wet a line, Greg coated his sunnies with egg yolk, and no one caught a fish. This year, the contingent split into two camps: beach and blue water.

### 20 July 2012

The blue water camp got to a good start. Tom and Keith pre-fished the outing by launching Tom's boat off Ulladulla to go reef fishing. Tom landed three blue morwong. Keith hooked up with a decent fish but was praying it wasn't a kingfish as he reckoned it wasn't going to reach the 65 cm mark. Fortunately, it turned out to be a 2 kg plus snapper.

I also pre-fished the outing, fishing the beach between 3.00 – 6.00 pm. The seas were pretty flat and it was hard to spot any decent gutters. The only gutter I could spot was 300 metres south. It didn't take long to hook up to my first salmon for the fishing year. I landed another seven salmon, although they only weighed between 500-800 grams each.

The remaining contingent arrived afterwards: Brian, Chris and Colin Clark, Dino, Kristin and Bruce, Greg and Rose, Chris Head, and Glen and Karen.

### 21 July 2012

The seas didn't look too bad the next morning and a trawler was happily cruising off the beach. Chris Head, the Clark Brothers and I headed down to the beach.

The Clark Brothers fished near the entrance to the tourist park while Chris and I headed to the gutter I marked on my iPhone the day before. Both spots fished well, the Clark Brothers

landed about twenty salmon between them, Chris landed 15 salmon (including a 1.06 kg salmon) and I landed seven. I would have got eight fish but one of them busted off my 1 kg line, only to get recaptured by Chris Clark 300 metres up the beach. Chris duly released the fish and returned my hook, sinker, surf popper and ten metres of fishing line.

Keith and Tom launched their boat off Ulladulla and attempted to fish the flathead grounds. Brian, Greg and Rose also launched off Ulladulla. They managed to get a few live baits close in, and then headed out to the Kingfish grounds. The forecasted 20-25 knot southerlies hit and they found themselves getting thrown around a fair bit. Since it was Rose's first time on Bluewater, they decided that it may be better up at Jervis Bay. They proceeded to Middle Ground in Jervis Bay in the vain hope of finding sheltered waters, Tom and Glen following.

Glen and Karen Malam managed to catch some livies at Plantation Point before heading to Middle Ground. Out at Middle Ground it was just as lumpy as it was at Ulladulla, and it was difficult to get a drift over the reef. Eventually Rose's Kwells failed, and it was time to return to dry land. Tom and Glen returned as well, with Glen and Karen getting drenched on the way back.

Dino, Bruce and Kristin lasted five minutes in their boat before they got sick of the drenching. They joined the Clark Brothers on the beach and Dino landed a 37 cm sand flathead and a large salmon that would have weighed 2 kg.

Chris and I stopped for lunch, a kip and some episodes of Family Guy before joining the Clark Brothers on the beach for an evening session. The fishing was a bit tougher but we all managed a few salmon each. I chucked a fresh slab of salmon fillet on some gang hooks on my 6 kilo outfit, which got taken by something big and unstoppable. I played it for a couple of minutes before it decided to get serious and busted me off with one powerful surge.

For a brief few minutes, the sun broke through the clouds bathing the beach and ocean in yellow and gold. We even spotted a dozen whales out in the ocean. However, this didn't last and the rain fell shortly afterwards.

We fished the same gutters as the previous morning. There was a strong southerly sweep but it was still possible to fish with 1 and 2 kg line. The Clark Brothers landed around ten salmon, Chris Head landed ten salmon (including a 1.06 kg fish on 2 kg line), Brian landed a couple and I landed three salmon and an undersized flathead.

# Fishing Lake Eucumbene again...

I wasn't planning a follow up to last month's article but I quickly changed my mind the following week. I visited Lake Eucumbene again on 1 July 2012, this time driving via the Monaro Highway through Cooma rather than Bobeyan Road again.

I arrived at my favourite spot at 2.30 pm and suddenly found myself fishing in blizzard conditions. This was new to me so I just wasn't sure what to expect. I was later joined by fly fisherman Steve Dunn. He had already landed a brown and a rainbow while working a different section of the bank. Steve hooked up to what might have been a kilo plus rainbow. Unfortunately, Steve lost his fish when it made a run for the shore.

I then landed a 520 gram rainbow followed very quickly with a 1.08 kg rainbow, both on yellow salmon egg. The clouds broke before sunset and bathed the lake and mountains in glorious shades of gold. The snowfall and wind started to ease and threatened a pleasant evening. This did not last and the blizzard conditions returned shortly after sunset. The evening finished with another two rainbows weighing around 600 grams each.

## Xtreme Adventure of a Lifetime 2012

This year I've gone for broke (figuratively, and literally according to my financial adviser) and decided to do the Kimberley by Land AND by Sea. And more by good luck than good management things have come together rather nicely, the lucky part being that I started planning many months ago as seats have disappeared faster than french champagne at a wedding (so much for the GFC!!).

So, this is what I have in mind for this year's Xtreme Adventure of a Lifetime ...

**First leg:** Darwin to Broome super cruise (14 nights, 26 June-9 July) aboard the trusty ol' Hyland-C with Darwin Bluewater Charters [<http://www.darwinbluewater.com.au/>]. Rather than a full-on 100% fishfest, on this occasion it'll be about 70/30 fishing /sight-seeing, with most opportunities dictated by the prevailing weather and the need to make speed whilst conditions permit (enormous distances are involved, like 800nm / 1500Km ... or about 100Km/day).

Hopefully the sea conditions will be calm(-ish) at this time of year, but you can never tell what with all the strange weather at present, and of course there's no avoiding the 20 hour gulf crossing which can be as smooth as an oil slick on a mill pond or a complete rock'n'roll horror show. Plus there's that nasty little section in the far NW which few ever get to experience (and on a bad day few would ever want to).

Mid-winter is definitely not the best time to chase trophy Barra so hopefully some brilliant blue water sessions will present an opportunity to test out that brand new heavy-duty jig-rig spooled with 80LB braid. Apparently, this is prime time for Spanish Mackerel so I've packed a few extra wire traces.



An added bonus not normally mentioned in the official literature is that apart from all the usual piscatorial pursuits, on this trip we get to target a rare and highly species in the form of garfish. Not as table tucker mind you, but rather to stock the freezers with bait for the game fishing extravaganza the following week (which is the main reason for the Skipper heading to Broome - Mal is a mad keen billfish'o). I've gar fished 'territory-style' once before which involved a hand net, spotlight, quick reflexes, and a bottle of rum - but that was just a bit of fun, whereas I suspect this time it'll be a bit more serious (so hopefully my southern skills will be up to the task).

I wouldn't ordinarily consider doing this particular trip due to all the uncertainties and potential to be sea sick for days on end, however, very few get the opportunity to experience the entire Kimberley coastline from the sea ... and it does dovetail rather nicely with the next leg.

**Second Leg:** After a few days R&R in Broome, or what I call W&W (Wash-up & Wind-down), I'll head inland for a 12 day (12-23 July) round trip safari (Broome-Broome) with Adventure Wild [[www.adventurewild.com.au](http://www.adventurewild.com.au)] to explore the more traditional side of the Kimberley covering both northern & southern routes as far east as Kununurra where ... you guessed it ... I've lined up a one-day charter on the Ord River with a local character called Hairy Dog.

Max 16 in the 4WD mini-coach, sleeping under the stars in swags for those who choose to 'rough it' (and single person tents for those who don't). The Easterlies have arrived early this year (again!), and far from balmy days and mild nights, apparently it gets bloody freezing as soon as the sun goes down - and I even hear inland travellers have been advised to pack winter woollies instead of thongs & t-shirts.

Anyway hopefully there'll be plenty of red sunsets & campfires, but not sure whether that extends to billy tea & damper. Apparently light camp duties are all part of the 'wilderness experience' which is a bit different to the Trip to the Tip I did a few years ago on my way to Thursday Island when there was no tent pitching or potato peeling ... which meant we could get into camp after dusk and set off again before sun-up and the only finger you had to lift all day was to press the shutter button, and at night to flip the lid on another stubby (or champagne cork).

**Final Leg:** Having travelled so far it'd be a shame not to explore what fishing opportunities Broome and near surrounds had to offer (apart from the famed local jetty). So, before heading home I'll spend a few days in the splendid Eco Beach resort about 130Km south of Broome

[<http://www.ecobeach.com.au/> and <http://www.barraddictsportfishing.com.au/assets/about.html>] where . you guessed it ... by day I'll be fishing in the company of the local guide, Kurt, and by night sleeping in a tent.

After all that, I should definitely be able to cross the Kimberleys off my bucket list once and for all, and so start looking at other destinations. There looks to be plenty of alluring destinations further afield ... for example, Canada seems like a wonderland of opportunities for a fly fisho [<http://www.flyfishalberta.com/fortresslake/> OR <http://nicholasdean.com/>], as does Christmas Is (Pacific Ocean NOT the other one)

## Mallacoota 2012

This is our 3<sup>rd</sup> annual trip to Mallacoota with a mate for my birthday.

Five full days of fishing for my birthday for not much return. The weather was windy and rained most nights. We checked the weather each morning and compared the difference between the Bureau of Meteorology ([www.bom.gov.au](http://www.bom.gov.au)) and WillyWeather ([www.willyweather.com.au](http://www.willyweather.com.au)) websites and there was some on most days. Day 4 was just about the same and wasn't nice so really took notice of it.

Water temp was around the 14 degrees according to Depth Sounder for the most part. We used soft plastics, Squidgy fish and wrigglers or vibes. When we were moving round we had out some hard bodies out trolling in shallow and medium divers.

25 July 2012, launched from bottom of the narrows and worked our way up both sides and round and up the arm to Captain Creek Jetty. Got basically nothing until later in day and picked up a barely legal flathead and bream in about 9.5 meters of water off snapper point, both got to swim another day. Out for about 6 1/2 hours.

26 July 2012, launched from Gypsy point and worked rock wall at Colemans Inlet as our first year this is where we cleaned up. Then down to Cape Horn Bay, did ok here last year. On way down was trolling a shallow diver and got hit and lost the lure without even getting a glimpse of what it was. Picked up a 50cm Salmon and that was fun as it pulled the kayak round for about 20



minutes. Worked the point on the right opposite the Jetty and up for an under size flat head. Also worked the large drop off for nothing. The water was very brackish all the way down to Cape Horn Bay, you could taste the lack of salt in the water. Out for about 5 1/2 hours.

27 July 2012, launched from next to the fishing platform near Fisheries Point. Worked both sides of the channel out to Rabbit Island, got our bag limit in an hour our first year here with flathead, one going 70cm, but for today nothing and then started to head over to Allan Head via the wrong side of Goodwin Sands. Had to back track to the channel and then edge round to Maxwell Point, then Swimming Point. Didn't get across the last stretch to Allan Head as the wind had started to pick up more, as per the weather forecast, so turned round here and fished Refuge Cove on the way back. Headed back to our launch point via Karbeethong Jetty to Rabbit Island. Picked up a nice 35cm Bream on the road side of Rabbit Island. Out for about 6 hours.

28 July 2012, forecast was for 30 knots of wind so no kayak fishing. Went and had a bit of a drive out past the airport and had a look at Betka River, found a proper boat "ramp" launch area on the way back, cause we were thinking we might not be able to launch here if the weather was better. Then had a look at a couple of the beaches but everywhere was too windy. Spent the afternoon fishing off the beach at the bottom of the narrows where the turn round point just past Buckland's Boat Hire. We used beach worms and a couple of pipis/cockles that took to our hooks. Got some very irregular bites and were far apart. Nothing. Fished for about 3 hours.

29 July 2012 and last day for fishing, launched from Sandy Point, picked up a 40cm bream within 5 minutes of launching trolling a shallow hard body. Thought this was a good sign, no. Went across to far bank and worked that down to Genoa River across Palmers Bank. My mate picked up a nice 38cm Bream so worked the area for a good forty minutes. When across to Smellies Inlet, was quite quick with the wind behind us. My mate got a 56cm flathead half way down the left hand bank. It was quite nice out of the wind here. After about 40 minutes here, it started to rain. This was the only time we actually got rained on the whole time on the water. I was working the right hand bank, near the corner where he got his and picked up a 33cm flathead, when my mate came up to tell me had finally found the fish and had 5 bream in his keeper bag all between 35cm and 42cm. Off I paddled down to there he had got them, there is a bicycle reflector nailed to a tree where he had got them, but they had moved on as I got nothing and he couldn't get any more either. Finally had had enough of the rain and the wind started to gust up so headed back to Sandy point to pack up and head back to unit. Talked to a couple who were fishing off the bank and they had only caught a couple of Salmon. Out for about 6 hours.

30 July 2012, pack up, drop unit key off and start 4 1/2 hour trip home.

We talked to a few of the locals and they said that there didn't seem to be much out there. The local Caltex bloke also mentioned that the weekend before the local fishing club had had their monthly comp for not much of a return either. Our first year here we really cleaned up but there hadn't been any rains for awhile. Last two years too much rain. Thinking next year won't plan it and will just go hoping the rain won't get the email about us going.

**Park News:** We are attempting to grow some grass over our powered sites. Six additional sites have also been added over winter. Additional seating is also being installed around the park. No word from the minister as yet on funding for the 3 fish cleaning shelters.

All members should now be aware of the changes to where, when & who needs to wear a life jackets. If you are still unsure have a look at the maritime website [www.maritime.nsw.gov.au/](http://www.maritime.nsw.gov.au/) and become familiar with the rules otherwise it could get expensive for you.

A lot of us have elected to purchase the new inflating jackets as they are far more comfortable to wear than the older more solid jackets. The club purchased over a dozen life jackets for members from Stormy a couple of years ago and, as discussed at the last general meeting, they are due for their 2 yearly manufacturer's service. When enquiring to get this done, we found out we would have to send them back to Stormy in Tasmania at extra cost. Most members thought this was very unreasonable and could not understand why this could not be done locally.

Well I am happy to say that there is now a local solution for all members & other local recreational fisherman and boating enthusiasts with PFD life jackets of most makes including Stormy life jackets.

## Environment groups get on board trawler protest



## 14 Night Darwin-Broome Adventure Of A Lifetime

**Darwin Bluewater Charters: Tues 26th June – Mon 9th July 2012**

**Trip Summary** (as told by Skipper, Mal Miles)

*(also refer to attached trip summary from a similar, albeit shorter, trip undertaken in 2007)*

We board the mother-ship, MV Hyland-C, in Darwin's picturesque Cullen Bay Marina, and from there quickly make our way down the Northern Territory coast towards Cape Scott and our first destination, the Little Moyle River, fishing and crabbing for a day or two [*been there, done that ☺*] or possibly longer (weather pending) before venturing out into open waters to cross the Bonaparte Gulf and arrive at the King George River on the North Kimberley Coast [*been there, done that ☺, and since this crossing can be a rock'n'roll horror show it's one I'm definitely not looking forward to*].

Having survived the open water crossing we'll then check out the King George Falls and Glycosmis Bay, with a possible detour to hunt for crays and beachcomb Leseur Island if weather conditions permit. We then round Cape Londonderry and arrive in the sheltered waters of Napier Broome Bay. From here we'll either explore and fish the Drysdale River for a day or two – or preferably (and again weather pending), we'll push on through to the very fishy Eclipse Islands, Vansittart Bay, to ultimately end up at Cassini Island for a dose of billfish and mackerel mayhem [*been there, done that ☺*].

If the weather is unfavourable we may not hang around the relatively exposed Cassini Is for long, but instead head towards the coast to the Mitchell River for a spot of barra fishing while we wait for the winds to moderate [*been there, done that ☺*].

*[as you might have gathered, so far this is a combination of my previous three trips with the Mitchell River and Cassini Is being as far West as I've ventured along the Kimberley Coast]*

We now steer for the Montalevit Islands to target coral trout, snapper, more GTs, and perhaps an evening garfish hunt will be on the agenda [*this involves a spot light & net*]. Moving on we'll discover fish ridden gems include Biddles Rock, Wolf Rock, Warne Island, Prince Shoal, to name but a few prime locations. From there we'll meander through the islands of the Admiralty Gulf, anchoring at the aptly named Shelter Bay on the Prudhoe Islands where we'll check out the Aboriginal art of Bigge Island. As we traverse these crystal clear waters and their highly reflective white sand bottom, we'll be keeping our eyes peeled for blue bastards [*this fish is highly prized by fly-fishos – ie: me*].

Since the GTs increase in size the further south we go, the plan is to get our arms stretched along the Maret Islands and Tooth Rocks. And having been spooled by massive GTs, a short visit to Jussieu Island is expected to leave us with an embarrassing shortage of mackerel lures as the resident razor gangs are just too big and too strong [*note to self – pack more wire traces*].

After things simmer down a bit we might even take a hike inland to swim at the beautiful freshwater Rainforest Ravine, hunt for crystals at Muffin Island, and delve into the creepy caves at Anderdon Bay. A balance diet in this area includes a daily bucket of Blacklips [*aka 6" oysters*]. If time permits we'll hopefully also take a peek into the stunning Prince Frederick Harbour and check out Careening Bay where Philip Parker King beached his boat over 200 years ago and etched his vessel's name into the 'Mermaid' Boab tree.

From this point south to Broome the fishing will take a back seat to the scenery as we pass a veritable vista of Kimberley magic every day. Treachery Pass, Hanover Bay, Raft Point, Ayres Rock in flood, Sampson Inlet, Red Cone Falls, Montgomery Reef (if we are allowed to go there still) plus the hidden Gems of Yampi Sound, Crocodile Creek and Sivergull are sure to impress as we transit through the Iron Islands. And if time permits we may even take a look at the horizontal waterfalls as well [*hope so*].

The trip will conclude with a non-stop 110nm [*ie: 12+hrs*] coastal run from Cape Leveque down to Broome with the chance of another sailfish a real possibility whilst we dodge whales and pearl leases.

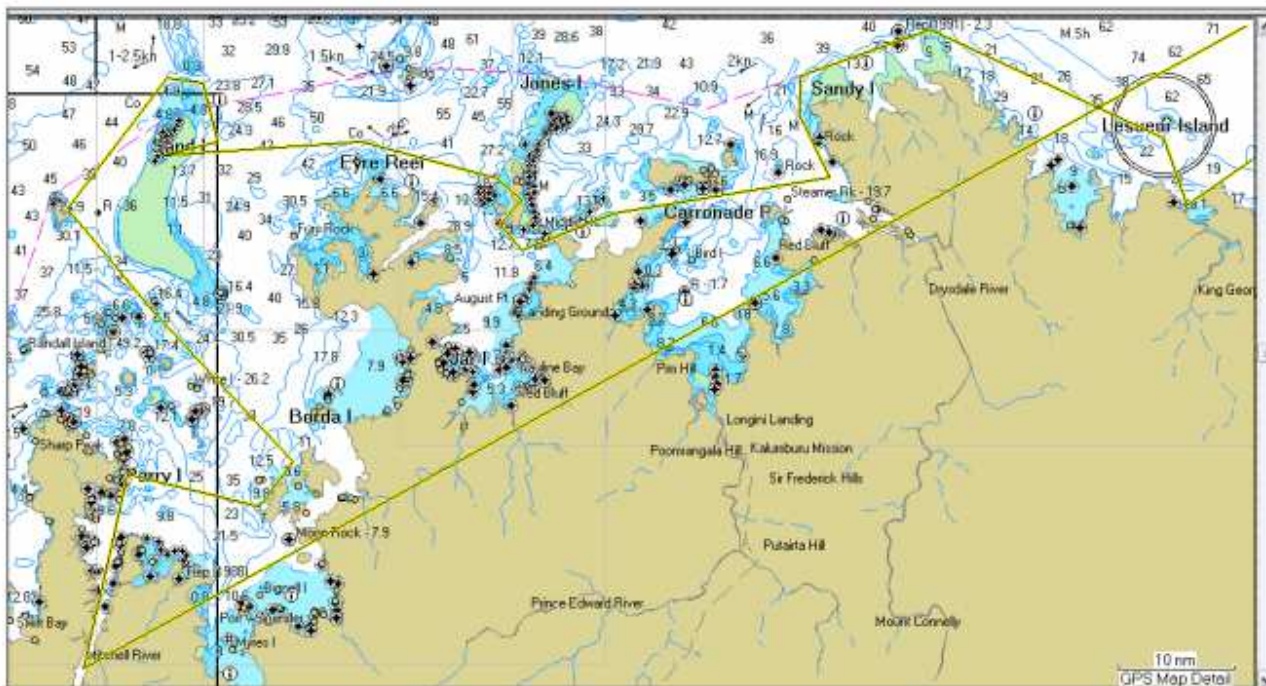

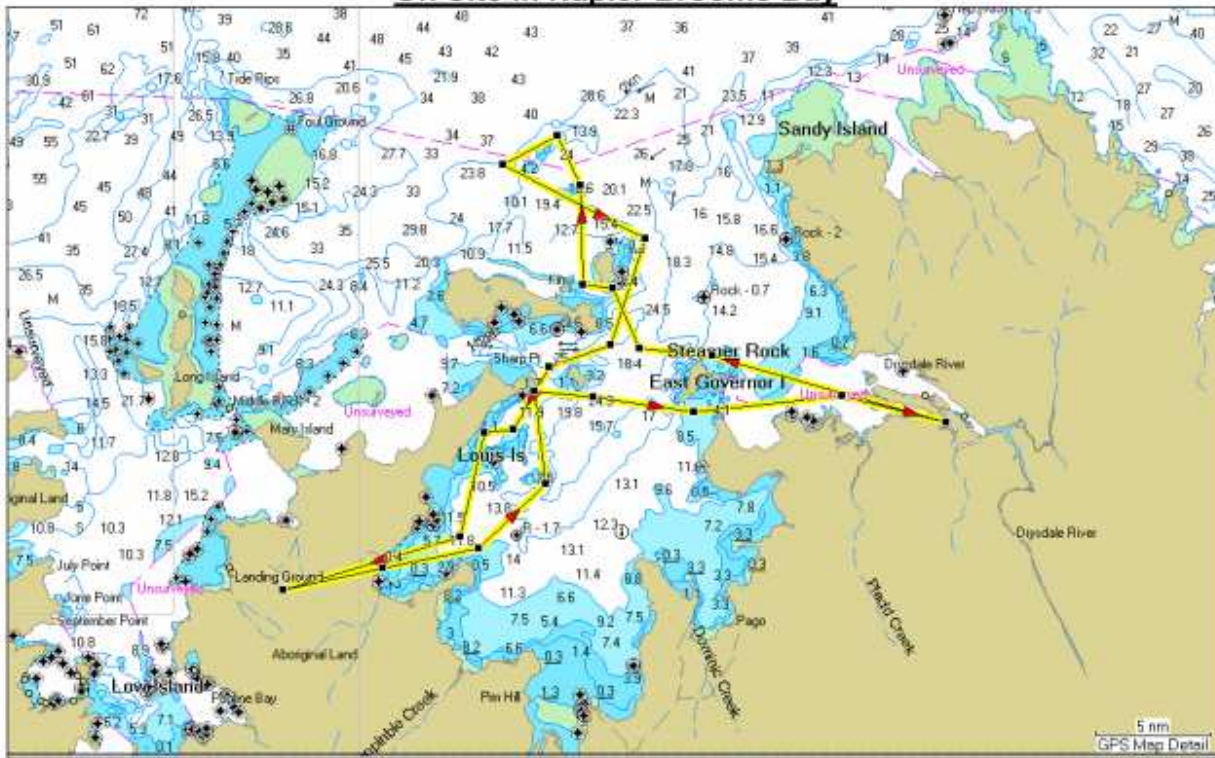
## Darwin to Moyle River overview

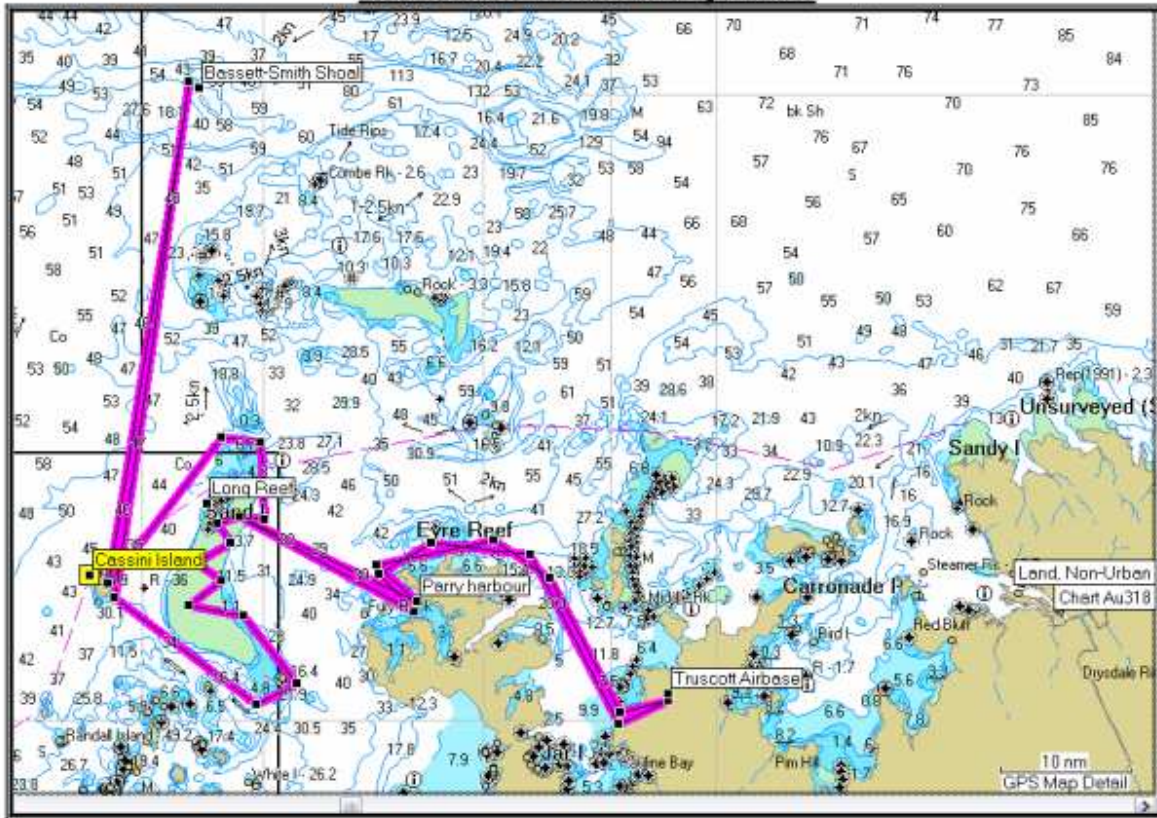
