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About the Club

The Canberra Fisherman's Club Inc. is a sport fishing club that endeavours to promote a social awareness among its members, single or family. General meetings are held on the second Tuesday of every month at the **Eastlakes Football Club No 3 Oxley St Griffith ACT** beginning at 7:30pm. All members and visitors are most welcome.

Members of the Canberra Fisherman's Club are eligible to set Club Records and, upon payment of an Australian National Sport fishing Association (ANSA) affiliation fee, also able to set Australian records, and World records (through ANSA affiliation with the International Game Fishing Association (IGFA)).

Aims of the Club

- To promote sport fishing
- To foster the art of angling
- To teach the art of angling to new members and particularly juniors
- To promote the study and conservation of fish species and the environment
- To co-operate with and support other bodies with similar aims and ideals.

The Club also supports the Recfish Australia National Code of Practice for Recreational and Sport Fishing, which endorses:

1. Quickly and correctly returning unwanted or illegal catch to the water
2. Quickly killing fish that are kept for consumption
3. Using only appropriate, legal tackle, attending gear and valuing the catch
4. Taking no more than our immediate needs
5. Supporting and encouraging activities that preserve, restore and enhance fisheries and fish habitat
6. Understanding and observing all fishing regulations and reporting illegal fishing activities
7. Preventing pollution and protecting wildlife by removing rubbish
8. Taking care when boating and anchoring to avoid damage to wildlife and habitat
9. Using established roads and tracks
10. Reporting environmental damage
11. Avoiding unnecessary interactions with wildlife species and their habitats
12. Practising courtesy towards all those who use inland and coastal waters
13. Obtaining permission from landholders and traditional owners before entering their land
14. Caring for our own safety and the safety of others when fishing.

Hi everyone

Happy New (Club) Year. The 2013-14 Annual Club Competition has virtually closed now and the results will be announced at the Presentation Night in September. Remember: if you've made any last-minute captures, you need to have all the paperwork in with the Recorder (John Bosch) by the 14th July.

The recent June outing was the traditional Queen's Birthday long weekend trip to Narooma. 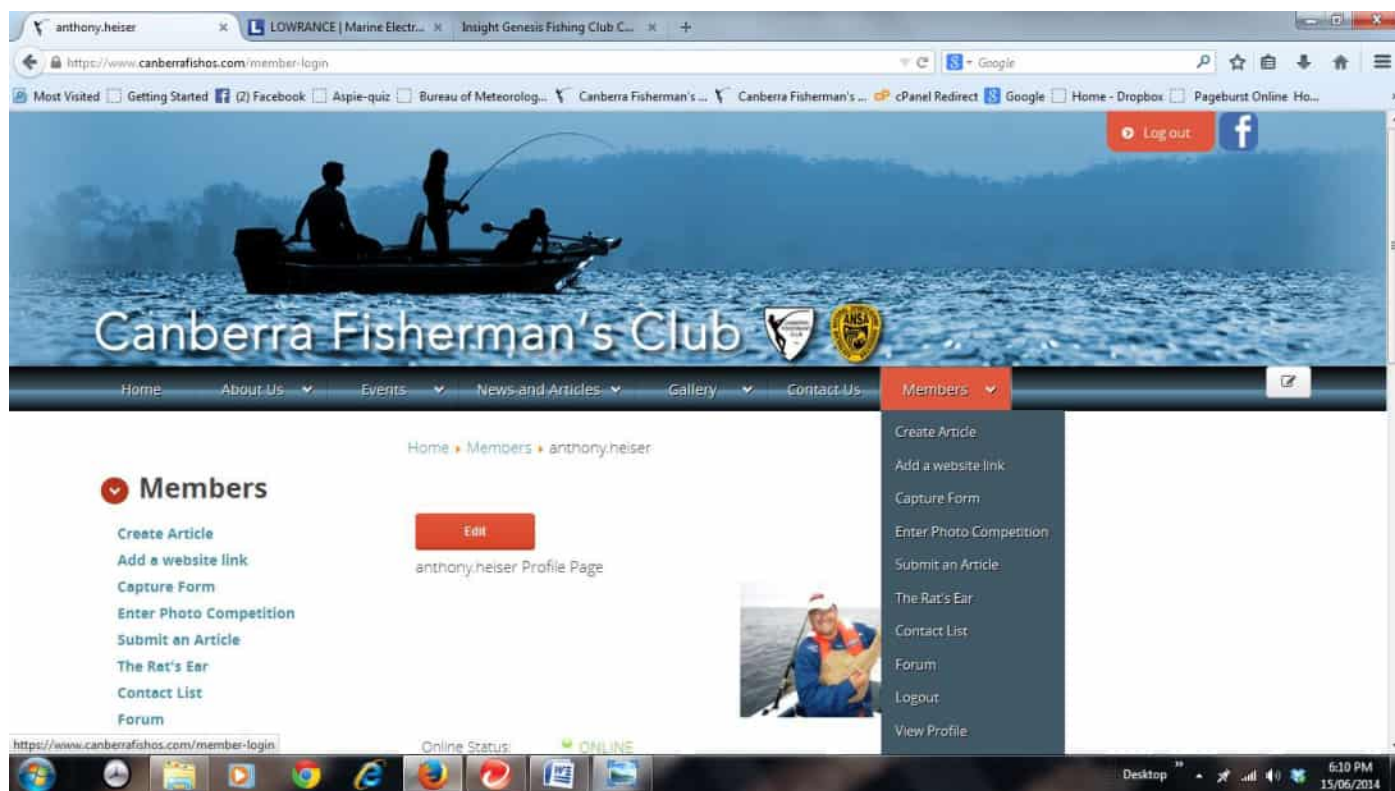
A nomination form is at the end of my report. Please don't forget to include a brief description of why you nominated someone for an award.

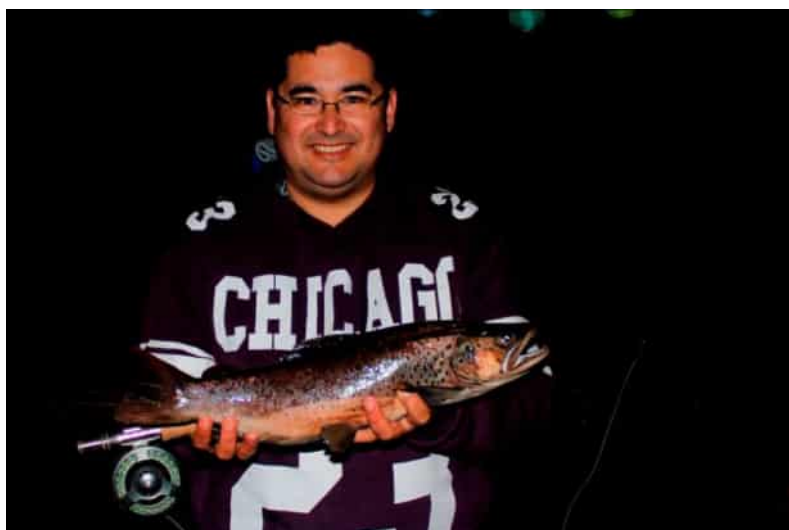
If you are like me and don't have a boat, most outings have land-based fishing opportunities. You won't be the only one stranded on shore. Do a bit of planning and research ahead of the outings and try and team up with other members who will be fishing off the bank or off the beach.

Finally, on a personal note, I wrote in the December 2013 Newsletter that my New Year Resolution in 2014 is to catch my first trout on fly. Well I'm pleased to say that I finally made a New Year Resolution that actually happened. After many weekends alternating between Eucumbene and Jindabyne, I finally landed my first trout on fly.

I caught a 1.6 kg Brown Trout measuring 53 cm at Anglers Reach, Lake Eucumbene, at 5.55 pm, 21 June 2014 on a black Woolly Worm. I was using 15 lb leader (6.8 kg) so it will only score 23 points, two points shy of being eligible for the Club Comp. But I've sent in my capture form nonetheless as it is a major milestone for me.

Thank you very much to Steve Dunn who gave me fly fishing lessons and continues to give me tips and advice on fly fishing.

If you can't be at the meeting, give me a call and we'll organise some way for it to get to me.

Burrinjuck Waters State Park Fishing Report – 21st June, 2014

Rain last seven days: 40 millimetres.

Water level current: 39 per cent.

Current discharge: 474 ML per day.

Current inflow: 1510 ML per day.

Water visibility: up to 1.5 metres.

New moon: July 8.

Full moon: June 23.

Murray Cod: Most fishermen found it tough going this weekend despite the weather again being bright sunny and calm, a bit cool in the mornings though. Anthony from Gundagai was one of the happy fisherman I spoke to, with two good cod on Sunday measuring 68 and 98 cm, both caught while trolling spinner baits. He followed up with a 65 cm on Monday caught while trolling a Stucky. Most of the other fishos, including myself, were fishless. The fish were caught between Cathedral Rock and Wade Island. There were several boats further up the Murrumbidgee with me that also did no good. The water temperature has continued to drop as the rain comes and the dam slowly rises. The big fish are still about for those willing to put in the time and brave the cool starts.

Yellow Belly: No joy at all this week. There were not too many boats out over the weekend so it was a bit hard to get a good read on how active the Yellow Belly still are. Waterways reported only finding six boats on the water on Sunday morning. The bait fishermen have been the most successful over recent weeks. The fishing during the day tends to be a bit quieter coming off the full moon. Dusk through until dark being the better time for the tougher fishermen who like it cold.

Redfin: Very quite, a couple of small ones was the extent of it.

Trout: No reports this week. No one has really been out targeting them as yet.

Silver Perch: No reports this week.

Park News: The new toilet block near the conference centre will be operational by the end of the month. We are also establishing a camp kitchen in that area over the next month or so and clearing some of the undergrowth to open up some more camping area.

Chasing Tailor on Fraser Island

Bob Davies with 26 Tailor he caught off Waddy Point in one hour of fishing on a trip in 2003. These days, there is a 35 cm size limit and possession limit of twenty Tailor in Queensland.

The target species for the 2014-15 Total Length Saltwater Trophy is Tailor, which provides a convenient pretext to write about one of my favourite fishing destinations – Fraser Island. It's true, I've caught (or seen :-()) far bigger Tailor down the South Coast, especially in St Georges Basin and Bega River. But other than that, it's hard not to find a reason to chase Tailor at Fraser Island.

Tailor are plentiful in the winter months, it's a great relief from the Canberra winter, and there is plenty of wildlife and scenic wonders to pursue.

What to catch

Obviously, there are plenty of Tailor. During the winter months, Tailor make their annual spawning run to an area between Indian Head and Waddy Point. However, I've caught Tailor in many of the gutters between Yidney Rocks and Indian Head.

When the Tailor are running, it's common to see anglers standing shoulder to shoulder with 10-15 foot rods and Alvey reels along the gutters. If you're not chasing ANSA points or Masters captures, then you're only problem will be the odd angler who can't cast in a straight line. I once spent a morning at Cathedral Beach losing fish to someone who kept casting over my line.

However, there are plenty of good gutters between Yidney Rocks and Indian Head if you want a quiet spot to chase Tailor on light gear. If you're fishing off the rocks at Waddy Point, there will be times during the day where you could fish with light gear since most anglers concentrate their efforts in the early morning and late afternoon.

In addition to Tailor, I've caught Dart, Sand Flathead, Queenfish, Trevally, Bream, Whiting and Mulloway off the beach or off the Rocks at Waddy Point.

Last year, I tried using the same beach fishing rig I used for chasing Salmon down the South Coast – single hook with a piece of pilchard and a surf popper. I had hoped that this would enable me to target both Tailor and Dart.

Unfortunately, the Dart pretty much ignored the bait and surf popper and I didn't catch Dart until I rigged up a light sinker and size 4 Kendall Kirby hook baited with worm or pippie. Given I have previously caught Dart on pilchards with gang hooks attached to a wire trace, I'm a bit perplexed why my Salmon rig did not work last year.

I've caught Sand Flathead on ganged pilchards when chasing Tailor. So far, my attempts of targeting Flathead in the gutters with blades and soft plastics have been unsuccessful.

I've only caught a few Mulloway, as I've dropped most of them or been busted off on numerous occasions.

Worms and pippies are great bait for Bream, Whiting and Dart. There are plenty of spots to collect pippies and beach worms. I'm pretty hopeless collecting beach worms but pippies are easy to locate on Fraser Island.

The best way to locate pippies is to go to the beach at low tide and look for mounds in the sand between the high and low water mark. Often, the 4WD tracks on the sand makes them easier to spot.

Where to fish

I don't fish Fraser Island frequently enough to provide definitive advice on this. My go to spots tend to be the gutters near Yidney Rocks, the Cathedrals, and off the rocks at Waddy Point. Another popular spot is the *Maheno* wreck although I've never had much luck there.

The conditions and where the fish are biting have been different each time I've been to Fraser. Generally, I have had to rely on local knowledge about where the fish are biting. The other thing I do is drive up and down the beach at low tide during the day and identify potential gutters to fish when the tide comes in. If I find a good gutter, I count the kilometres between it and where we are staying to make it easier to locate afterwards (especially in the early hours of the morning).

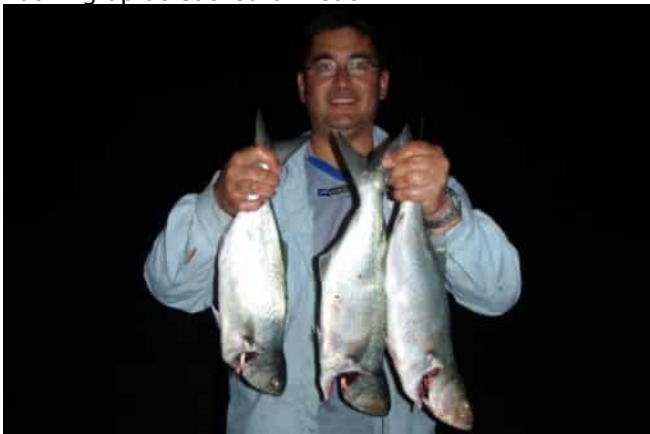
Waddy Point is a great rock fishing spot for Tailor and has been reliable on all but my last two trips to Fraser. Angler activity is busiest in the early morning and late afternoon. I notice a lot of the anglers stop fishing by late morning which will give you enough room if you want to target Tailor on light gear.

I've only ventured north of Waddy Point once, on my one and only trip to Sandy Cape. I've heard great things about the fishing up there but I'm yet to experience it myself.

Please note that from midday 1 August to midday 30 September, fishing is banned from Indian Head to Waddy Point to protect the Tailor as they congregate here for spawning. Fishing is also banned year round at Middle Rock and all freshwater lakes and creeks.

Other things to do on Fraser Island

Fraser Island is World Heritage listed and is up there with Kakadu, Uluru, and the Great Barrier Reef on the list of must see places. There are many places to visit including many freshwater lakes, ancient rainforests, sand blows, and stunning cliffs of coloured sand. Places to visit include:

The Maheno wreck



Popular spot for a photograph or some fishing.

Lake McKenzie



One of the island's best-known freshwater lakes, McKenzie is a great swimming spot.

The Champagne Pools



Just north of Indian Head, these beautiful rock pools are filled with bubbling seawater and make excellent swimming holes at low tide!

Eli Creek



The Largest freshwater creek along the east coast, with over four million litres of water flowing into the ocean every hour! Keep an eye out for Perch hiding in the snags.

Lake Wabby



Surrounded by a massive sand-blow, this is the deepest of the island's lakes and a great place to swim. You can find Forktail Catfish and Rainbow Fish here too.

Central Station



Originally established as a forestry township, this beautiful rainforest area features a boardwalk that follows Wanggoolba Creek. It's a great place to go for a bush walk and enjoy the Fraser Island forestry.

The wildlife

Fraser Island has abundant wildlife so make sure you bring a good camera.

Expect to see a few dingoes on the beach. Always keep the lid on your fishing bucket on tight - a friend of mine had his catch stolen one night. Obviously you will find live (and dead) turtles on the beach too.

Getting there

First of all, you definitely need a 4WD. We rented a Toyota Landcruiser on my first trip – I can't remember which company we rented from or the price as this was back in 1999. But you can pick up rental 4WDs from Rainbow Beach for \$200-\$300 per day.

Rainbow Beach is 240 km north of Brisbane or a three hour drive. There you purchase your 4WD permit and barge ticket. While you are there, it's a good idea to fill up at the Shell Service Station as diesel and petrol on the Island often goes north of \$2 per litre. While you



are there, go and have a coffee and pie at Ed's Bakery next door. The Shell sells bait and tackle, as does the camping shop round the corner.

From Rainbow Beach, you make your way up to Inskip Point and catch the barge to Hook Point (also known as Moon Point) on the Southern tip of Fraser Island.

It's pretty easy driving along Seventy-Five Mile Beach but beware of the coffee rock between Payungan Rocks and Happy Valley, especially at night time. The coffee rock may be impassable when the tide is high.

The track from Indian Head to Waddy Point can be difficult. Watching cars get bogged on the soft sand (bottom left) at Indian Head is actually a local pastime.

Also, be careful when driving on the beach at night, as sea mist can greatly reduce visibility. Another thing to watch out for at night time is the dips when crossing

creeks on the beach. Freshwater creeks flowing out to the ocean can carve out some steep dips on the beach. It's not always possible to see the dips and I've hit my head on the roof of the car a couple of times coming back from Waddy Point in the evening.

Finally, check you are covered for roadside assistance on Fraser Island or be prepared to fork out some dollars. The nearest tow truck is from Rainbow Beach. One poor driver I ran into at Orchid Beach in 2005 was not covered for roadside assistance on Fraser Island and had to fork out \$1,300 for the tow truck (bottom right).



Where to stay

I'm not one who is big on camping but there are plenty of places to camp off the beach on Fraser Island. The advantage is that you will be right on the beach and don't have to walk far to go fishing. If you are like me and prefer a bit more comfort, I can suggest three places.

Yidney Rocks Beachfront Apartments (www.yidneyrocks.com.au)



This is my favourite place to stay because the fishing is right on your doorstep. Located 65 km north of Hook Point, it has five very comfortable self-contained units and a cabin. Each unit has BBQ facilities and there is a fish cleaning table near the entrance to the beach. Shops and petrol are a few kilometres away at Happy Valley. The only down side is that Waddy Point is still another 50 minutes drive (40 km away). However, this is a small price when you consider these are the only beachside units on the ocean side of Fraser Island.

Cathedrals on Fraser (www.cathedralsonfraser.com.au)

A further 9 km north is Cathedrals on Fraser, which has camping spots and self-contained two bedroom cabins. It has an excellent shop selling food, ice creams, bait, alcohol and petrol. Unlike Yidney Rocks, the cabins are not overlooking the beach and you have to walk 500 m to 1.5 km to the nearest gutters.



Orchid House (www.orchidhouse.com.au)



Located on Orchid Beach 110 km north of Hook Point, it is a spacious self-contained beach house within close proximity to Waddy Point. Shops are only a few kilometres away and it has an outdoor entertainment area with a fireplace. The downside is fishing spots are not within walking distance and its use of solar panels for electricity means you won't be able to plug in a TV, car refrigerator or heater. Also, bear in mind that fishing at Waddy Point to Indian Head is banned in August and September before booking this place.

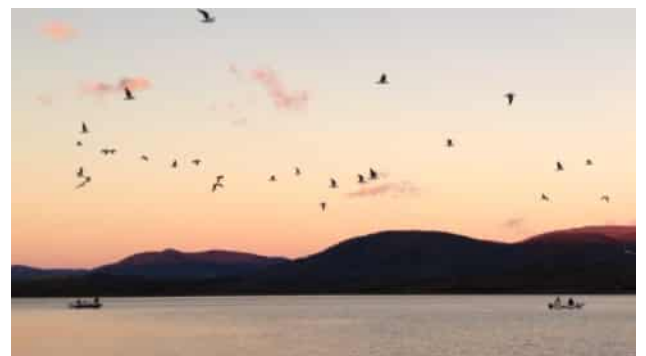

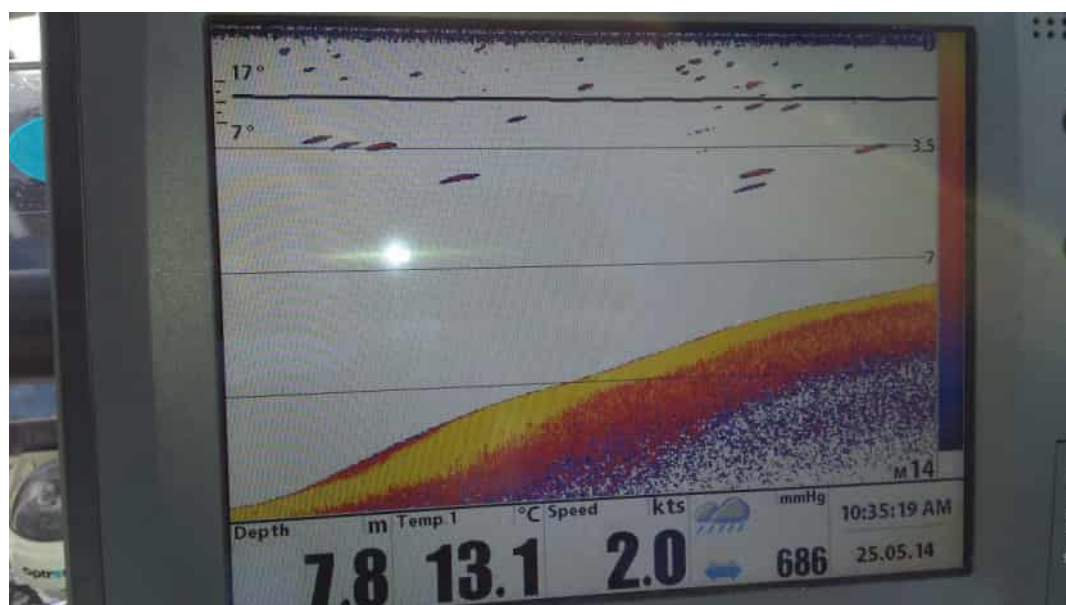
