Members of the Canberra Fisherman's Club are eligible to set Club Records and, upon payment of an Australian National Sport fishing Association (ANSA) affiliation fee, also able to set Australian records, and World records (through ANSA affiliation with the International Game Fishing Association (IGFA)).

Aims of the Club

- To promote sport fishing
- To foster the art of angling
- To teach the art of angling to new members and particularly juniors
- To promote the study and conservation of fish species and the environment
- To co-operate with and support other bodies with similar aims and ideals.

The Club also supports the Recfish Australia National Code of Practice for Recreational and Sport Fishing, which endorses:

1. Quickly and correctly returning unwanted or illegal catch to the water
2. Quickly killing fish that are kept for consumption
3. Using only appropriate, legal tackle, attending gear and valuing the catch
4. Taking no more than our immediate needs
5. Supporting and encouraging activities that preserve, restore and enhance fisheries and fish habitat
6. Understanding and observing all fishing regulations and reporting illegal fishing activities
7. Preventing pollution and protecting wildlife by removing rubbish
8. Taking care when boating and anchoring to avoid damage to wildlife and habitat
9. Using established roads and tracks
10. Reporting environmental damage
11. Avoiding unnecessary interactions with wildlife species and their habitats
12. Practising courtesy towards all those who use inland and coastal waters
13. Obtaining permission from landholders and traditional owners before entering their land
14. Caring for our own safety and the safety of others when fishing.

Recorder's Report

G'day all,

How quickly the year rolls around! It's that time of year again where I will start keeping the competition statistics to myself. This year's competition is shaping up to be a little closer than last year's. Looking at the current standings there's almost a different name at the top of each competition. The length based competitions are also much closer this year.

At this time of year the committee also puts their heads together and comes up with any changes needed to the club by-laws as well as the coming year's length competition species. This year it has been decided to stay with European Carp as the fresh water species as the competition has been quite fierce the last two years. For the salt water length competition it was decided that we will target Tailor next year. Given the number of large Tailor being caught at St. George's Basin around this time of year, it could be a very interesting competition!

There has also been a small change to the by-laws that I would like to bring to all club members' attention as it affects the club competitions. There has been some confusion over whether non pre-test line could be used in the club competitions. The committee has decided that as we are an ANSA club we should aim to be as close to the ANSA rule book as possible. As such the following paragraph will be added to section 14.b of the by-laws;

*Captures must comply with the ANSA rules for line and equipment eligibility.
Captures must be made on "signature" or "factory" pre-test line. Captures on standard line that has been submitted to ANSA and deemed "signature" pre-test will be accepted at the designated/tested breaking strain*

This means that all point based competitions (the overall club, fresh water, salt water, land based, ladies and junior champions, along with all "Best Fish" categories and, by inference the MVA competition) now require pre-test line of some form. The last sentence of the above change does allow standard line to be treated as pre-test line if it has been tested by ANSA.

One of the repercussions of this is that it is very important that you correctly fill in the pre-test line column on both your own capture sheets and the outings sheets as I will have to assume the line is not pre-test line if there is no entry.

Note also that the length based, board fish and all-tackle competitions are not line class based so captures on standard line qualify for each of these categories.

That's all I have for this month. Keep the captures coming as there's only a couple of months left in this year's competition. If you have any questions about the by-law changes please don't hesitate to ask me, either by email or in person at the one of the monthly meetings.

News & Stories

Burrinjuck Waters State Park Fishing Report – 30th May, 2014

Current discharge: 489 ML per day.

Water level current: 55.5 per cent.

Current inflow: 1499 ML per day.

Water visibility: up to one metre in main basin.

Rain last seven days: 22 mm.

Forecast weather: Looks like the fine weather has come to an end. Thirty mm of rain is predicted for the weekend. Temperatures will range between nine and 18 degrees Celsius and there will be winds up to 10 km/h.

New moon: May 29.

Full moon: June 13.

Water temperature: 17-20 degrees Celsius.

Murray cod: We have a new moon this week, which is my favourite time to fish Burrinjuck. The last week has seen some fantastic weather and some fantastic fish were also caught. We had our first one metre cod for quite some time, which was caught around Macey's Bay and released by the guys from the Gundagai Anglers Club. We're still waiting on the promised photo. The catch rates have remained about the same as last week with mostly smaller fish being picked up on the troll. A few fish are also being picked up by the bait fishermen bobbing around trees with shrimp or yabbies or off the bank in the evenings.

Yellow belly: Have continued as they have for several weeks now. Bait fishing deep on trees in the Murrumbidgee Arm. John managed seven yellows on shrimp in under an hour averaging 50 cm. Not all trees are producing fish so it is a matter of moving around until you find that tree in 30 to 60 feet of water. Lure guys continue to do it tough with no reports coming in from the lure fishermen at all this week.

Park news: Accommodation is now booked out for the June long weekend. There are still plenty of powered sites and unpowered camping. Yes you can have a camp fire. Must be in a drum or established fire pit. Bring your own cut wood or you can purchase a bag at the shop.

Smarter photos with your smart phone

Camera phones are extremely convenient and great for sharing photos with friends either by text message or e-mail and for instantly uploading onto social media such as Facebook. These days, most smart phone cameras come with a range of functions and aps that mobile phone cameras did not have only a few years ago. It will be interesting to see where this technology takes us in the next few years.

Nevertheless, smart phone cameras have their limitations. In my experience with an iphone 4 and 5S, I have found that they take good quality close-up shots and wide angle scenery shots when there is good lighting. In some cases, they also take great panorama shots.

On the other hand, you will struggle to get a good shot of an animal in the distance or get a sharp image when attempting action shots. Photos are not that great on overcast days. In addition, the proximity of the flash to the lens in the iPhone pretty much often makes night shots a waste of time unless you can find a way to prevent the flash glaring in the corner of the photo.

You also have little room for error in composing a shot as the image resolution is usually insufficient to allow you to crop poorly composed photos on a computer. But if you work within those limitations, then you can take some great photos with your smart phone.



Quite often when someone hands you their camera asking for a snapshot of their capture, you probably have a number of distractions that might result in you taking a photo similar to this photo of John Bosch holding a 40 cm Flathead. For example, you might have got the boat off the ramp onto the trailer and you are eager to finish cleaning up and getting back home.

So you grab the camera and just take the photo from where you are standing and quickly point and click. In doing so, chances are the person in the photo is too far away from the camera and things in the background like the toilet block to the right John's head get overlooked.

In most cases, you could salvage the photo by cropping the image if you were using a digital SLR or some of the better compact digital cameras. However, as you can see from the image below, smart phones leave little or no room for error.

Even if there was sufficient image resolution in the photo, you still have the unsightly toilet block next to John's head in this photo.



Taking photos of the fish

When you are taking a photo of a fish you just caught, then some simple steps to follow are:

- fresh is best – take the photo as soon as you can while the colours of the fish are still vibrant
- clean off any blood or dirt on the fish
- wet the fish to give it a nice shiny look
- place your fish on a simple background, one that is not distracting or going to camouflage the fish
- fill the screen with the fish – take the photo as close to the fish as possible
- during the day, avoid casting a shadow over the fish
- shoot in landscape orientation
- silvery fish can act like a mirror –check your photo to make sure the fish did not reflect the sunlight or flashback into the camera and reshoot the photo from a different angle if necessary.



This trout blended in nicely with the bank when I shot this photograph.



The wet beach sand makes a great background for most fish. However, silvery fish like this little salmon can act like a mirror for the camera flash or sunlight.



This salmon almost fills the frame, is still nice and fresh and has no blood dripping down its sides. The simple background ensures your eyes are not distracted from the fish. There is no glare of sunlight or the flash being reflected back onto the camera.

Taking photos of the angler and the fish

When you are taking photos of the angler and fish, then follow these simple steps:

- fresh is best – take the photo as soon as you can while the colours of the fish are still vibrant
- clean off any blood or dirt on the fish
- wet the fish to give it a nice shiny look
- Have the photographer stand with his or her back to the sun
- Use a simple background
 - If you are on a boat, stand with your back to the water and away from all the gear and other stuff on the boat
 - Be aware of objects behind the angler, when we are taking photos of an angler and fish, it is very easy to overlook things in the background that can ruin a shot.
- Holding the fish:
 - use both hands to make the fish look heavier
 - hold it out towards the camera to make it look bigger
 - hold the fish horizontally or at a 45° angle with the head pointing upwards
 - Give the fish a shake to get the fins erect
- Shoot the photo at eye level and fill the photo with the angler and fish
- Have the angler remove his hat and sunnies (often easier said than done)
- Best time of day is the early morning and late afternoon but if you are taking a photo in the middle of a bright sunny day, then use your flash to fill in the shadows on the angler's face.

With these types of photos, there's no hard and fast rule as to whether to shoot the photo in portrait or landscape orientation. As I said earlier, the aim is to fill the photo with the angler and fish so the best orientation will depend on which way best fills the photo.



There can be a lot of distractions in the back ground when taking photos on board boats such as fishing gear, consoles or, in this case, someone's backside. This could have been avoided by getting Zane to stand against a less cluttered background and holding the camera closer to him to fill the frame.



Here, Zane is standing against a less cluttered background, and is filling more of the frame compared to the photo on the left. In addition, he is not standing against a sunlit background, which is why the photo on the left looks a little washed out.

These tips on are not hard and fast rules but will help get a better quality photograph. But for every rule, there is always a good excuse for breaking them. For example, a one hand grip can work well with the right pose. Taking a photo with the camera looking down on the angler rather than at eye level is not a bad option if you are over your optimum BMI like myself – just make sure you hold the fish towards the camera.

Taking a photo with the angler's back to the sun (preferably in early morning or late afternoon) can light up the angler's hair and give a great photo if your smart phone's flash is strong enough to prevent the angler silhouetting in the sun.

I notice some members face the camera holding their fish like a torpedo. Personally, I've never understood this technique as it tends to reduce the size of the fish in the photo and you don't get to see the whole fish. If you must do the torpedo thing, then make sure it's a decent fish and take some additional shots with the conventional holds.

Having said that, I've seen some effective photos with the angler pointing the head towards the camera – I've not quite worked out how to replicate such shots but it appears the trick is to have fish held out towards the camera head first and angled so you can still see the rest of the fish. The resulting photo makes the fish look big compared to the angler and gives the photo a bit more dimension than a conventional grip and grin photo.

Holding the camera

One final tip: how you hold your smart phone when taking photos is important.

The typical way most people operate their smart phone is to hold it upright and operate with one hand. However, I suggest that if you want to use your smart phone as a camera, then hold it like a camera. Unless you are doing a selfie, then always use two hands to hold the camera. Using both hands helps keep the camera level and also keeps it steady to reduce blurring of photos due to camera shake.

In addition, do not grip the camera tightly or hold it out with outstretched hands as both will cause camera shake. Keep your fingers away from the front of the camera to prevent fingers creeping into camera's field of view. If your smart phone has a case with a lens cover on it, take care to ensure the photo is not partially obscured by the cover.

Finally, get yourself accustomed to holding the camera horizontally rather than upright. While there is nothing wrong with shooting photos in portrait compared to landscape orientation, you always need to consider whether a landscape or portrait orientation will produce a better photograph. There is a real danger you will default to portrait orientation every time you take a photo simply because of the way smart phones are designed to be held.

Smart phones cannot compete with digital SLRs and most compact digital cameras for photo quality. While smart phones have their limitations, you can take great photos by following the basic tips I've outlined in this article. And naturally, these tips are equally applicable to digital SLRs and compact digital cameras.




After dinner a few of us moved into the warmer climes of the communal lounge which had the wood fire going and telly on the football.
