Members of the Canberra Fisherman's Club are eligible to set Club Records and, upon payment of an Australian National Sport Fishing Association (ANSA) affiliation fee, also able to set Australian records, and World records (through ANSA affiliation with the International Game Fishing Association (IGFA)).

General meetings are held on the second Tuesday of every month at the **Croatian Deakin Soccer Club, 3 Grose Street, Deakin**, beginning at **6:45 pm**. All members and visitors are most welcome.

Aims of the Club

- To promote sport fishing
- To foster the art of angling
- To teach the art of angling to new members and particularly juniors
- To promote the study and conservation of fish species and the environment
- To co-operate with and support other bodies with similar aims and ideals.

The Club also supports the Recfish Australia National Code of Practice for Recreational and Sport Fishing, which endorses:

1. Quickly and correctly returning unwanted or illegal catch to the water
2. Quickly killing fish that are kept for consumption
3. Using only appropriate, legal tackle, attending gear and valuing the catch
4. Taking no more than our immediate needs
5. Supporting and encouraging activities that preserve, restore and enhance fisheries and fish habitat
6. Understanding and observing all fishing regulations and reporting illegal fishing activities
7. Preventing pollution and protecting wildlife by removing rubbish
8. Taking care when boating and anchoring to avoid damage to wildlife and habitat
9. Using established roads and tracks
10. Reporting environmental damage
11. Avoiding unnecessary interactions with wildlife species and their habitats
12. Practising courtesy towards all those who use inland and coastal waters
13. Obtaining permission from landholders and traditional owners before entering their land
14. Caring for our own safety and the safety of others when fishing.

President's Report

The newsletter's back! - My apologies for the long wait for this newsletter. It's been a very busy time as the Club searches for a post-COVID 'normal' – whatever that is!

The Committee has decided to return to hosting our annual Burrinjuck Convention this November. Jason Rogers has volunteered to take on the role of Burrinjuck Chair this year and he's already looking at ways we might streamline the event to reduce the workload on volunteers. Mel Marlborough has volunteered to take on the sponsorship officer role and has also got some great ideas for the Convention. Thanks Jason and Mel – I reckon it's going to be a great convention!

The Committee has also decided to bring back the Canberra Carp-Out in 2023. Again, we'll be looking at ways to streamline the event to make it a bit easier for our volunteers.

Those of us that fished Montague Island came back with a few legal kingfish (from the big schools of rats) as well as a few plate-size bonus snapper. The guys fishing the estuaries caught some good-size flathead and bream – but the stand-out was Chris Lemmon's huge 1.45kg Tailor on 1kg line. He's giving the Club Championship a real nudge this year – check out the latest standings below.

CFC still holds a few spots in the NSW ANSA 12 Month Competition, but some of the other clubs have recently sent in some great entries (see the 12 Month Comp standings, below), so we need to get more entries to the State Recorder (hint – that's me).

We have our "exotic location" fishing trip to South West Rocks organised for the week following the ANZAC long weekend, which should provide lots of opportunity to have a good hard crack at the 12 Month Comp. Andy McGovern - Fishing Journalist

Andy needs no introduction to Australia's keen freshwater fishermen, being an extraordinarily prolific fishing journalist. A regular writer for Freshwater Fishing magazine (among many others), Andy has penned around 300 informative magazine articles to help others on their journey to improve their fishing. He's also responsible for fishing atlases covering the ACT and southern NSW regions and is a regular on stage at tackle shows and club nights.

Andy's Top Tips For Snowy Lakes Trout

- Autumn is a good time to target pre-spawn trout as they condition up ready to move up into the rivers. Late spring is another prime time with flooded banks, warming water, and an abundance of insect life encouraging trout into the shallows. However trout fishing is possible all year-round in the Snowy storages, and of course is the only option when rivers and streams are closed from mid June through to early October.
- Fish tend to feed best during the low light periods, particularly at dawn but also well into the night on warm summer evenings. During the day they still take lures, but it's more of an aggressive response, rather than feeding response. Subtle lures work well on the feeding fish during low light, with stronger actioned lures better during the rest of the day.
- Wind is your friend when fishing for impoundment trout. Wind creates currents, oxygenates and cools the water, stirs up insects and other aquatic life, all of which stimulate trout to bite more freely.
- Fishing the bank with the wind in your face not at your back is often uncomfortable for the angler and under extreme conditions casting can be severely reduced. However, it's by far the most productive way to find trout, even when the water is a little discoloured by the wave action. This is where the food will be and trout tend to feel less threatened when feeding under cover of a rippled surface and slightly turbid water.

- Trout are not as smart as anglers sometimes like to think. They are largely instinctive, so if you focus on the environmental conditions that encourage trout to bite you'll usually do well.
- Overcast, drizzly days can be uncomfortable for anglers, but they suit the trout, so put on some warm clothes and waterproofs and break out the thermos.
- Be prepared to try different things. If you're not catching fish using one technique or lure, try changing it. Shift locations if you're not having any luck until you find where the fish are.
- Fishing a yabby pattern is particularly effective immediate pre and post spawn when trout are "conditioning" and actively feeding on crustaceans. If land-based look for evidence of fresh yabby holes, noting that yabbies will always relocate when the water level rises or drops so don't be fooled by old yabby beds. Another good sign is fresh yabby shells left on the bank by foxes and birds.
- Autumn trout in Lakes Eucumbene and Jindabyne are preparing for a spawning run, so they're often found somewhere near the original creek bed. Use your sounder to find the structure and the fish, but don't underestimate the value of your eyes in finding fish either.
- These lakes can get nasty for small boats during strong wind, so if it gets over 25 knots, leave the boat on the trailer and walk the shoreline. You may not catch as many fish but you'll be a lot warmer, drier and safer.

Andy's Trout Fishing Tackle

- Trout are a great sport fish, but you don't need the latest, gold plated, top of the line tackle to catch them. Entry level gear is fine and won't limit your opportunities.
- Andy uses a 2-4kg 7ft Quantum Smoke spinning rod and a 2000-2500 size Quantum Smoke Inshore Series III reel. He spools the reel with 6-8lb Rovex Viros or Siglon braid.
- A decent length of leader is a good idea, but make sure it's not so long that the knot is on your spool, which can cause or premature knot failure. Andy uses 4-8lb flurocarbon leader and connects it to the braid with an improved albright knot.

Andy's Best Trout Lures for Eucumbene and Jindabyne

- First thing in the morning when the fish are feeding around the edges is a great time to fish a minnow shaped soft plastic. Andy likes the 3" Fish Arrow Flash J Shad and usually fishes it on 1-3gram jig heads but finds that he rarely needs to go any heavier than 2g (1/16oz) unless casting into wind where some extra weight will assist.
- Rapala shallow diving hard body in Spotted Dog brown trout pattern is a great choice for this style of fishing. Andy likes the sinking version (CD5 and CD7) for fishing around timber and the floating version (Original Floating F5 and F7) over mud flats where he wants to impart more action.
- Hand-crafted wooden Taylor Made Nippy Nymph (50mm) is Andy's other top pick, especially in natural colours that imitate yabbies, such as orange, green, olive or brown. These will bump the bottom in 1.5m of water, throwing up puffs of mud and looking very much like a yabby.


