Members of the Canberra Fisherman's Club are eligible to set Club Records and, upon payment of an Australian National Sport Fishing Association (ANSA) affiliation fee, also able to set Australian records, and World records (through ANSA affiliation with the International Game Fishing Association (IGFA)).

General meetings are held on the second Tuesday of every month at the **Croatian Deakin Soccer Club, 3 Grose Street, Deakin**, beginning at **6:45 pm**. All members and visitors are most welcome.

## Aims of the Club

- To promote sport fishing
- To foster the art of angling
- To teach the art of angling to new members and particularly juniors
- To promote the study and conservation of fish species and the environment
- To co-operate with and support other bodies with similar aims and ideals.

The Club also supports the Recfish Australia National Code of Practice for Recreational and Sport Fishing, which endorses:

1. Quickly and correctly returning unwanted or illegal catch to the water
2. Quickly killing fish that are kept for consumption
3. Using only appropriate, legal tackle, attending gear and valuing the catch
4. Taking no more than our immediate needs
5. Supporting and encouraging activities that preserve, restore and enhance fisheries and fish habitat
6. Understanding and observing all fishing regulations and reporting illegal fishing activities
7. Preventing pollution and protecting wildlife by removing rubbish
8. Taking care when boating and anchoring to avoid damage to wildlife and habitat
9. Using established roads and tracks
10. Reporting environmental damage
11. Avoiding unnecessary interactions with wildlife species and their habitats
12. Practising courtesy towards all those who use inland and coastal waters
13. Obtaining permission from landholders and traditional owners before entering their land
14. Caring for our own safety and the safety of others when fishing.

2020-21 finished on a satisfying note, with Chris Lemmon landing his first Dart together with a respectable 32.5 cm 0.485 kg Bream (on 1 kg line) just south of the Queensland border, Ian and I landed our first Australian Salmon off Cemetery Beach at the Narooma Outing.

Karen also did well with the Australian Salmon at that outing too. Meanwhile, Anthony has been exploring new fishing spots at Woolli, chasing Dusky Flathead and Swallowtail Dart off the beach.

Clearly, 2021-22 is looks set to be an awesome year. To make this happen, we need you to do four things.

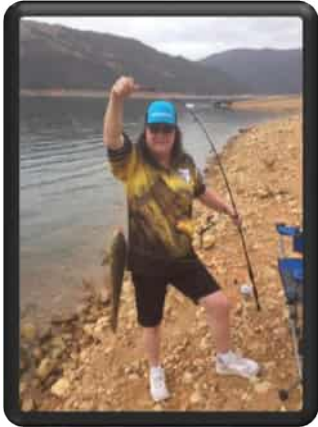

# Cape York/Far North Queensland

A Flyfishing Adventure of Hits & Misses recounted by the Xtreme Armchair Angler  
(25 June–02 July, 2021)

**Location:** Cape York and the Five Western Rivers North of Mapoon



**Mothership:** Eclipse-D (+ 3 Tenders)



**Species on offer:** 31

To arrive at my final destination required 3 flights from Canberra via Brisbane with an overnight stay in Cairns before the final leg to Weipa. The stopover suited me just fine because it provided an ideal opportunity to catch-up for a meal and a few beers with my Cairns-based virtual fishing buddy, Greg Vinall (aka Doc Lures), host of the Australian Lure Fishing podcast.

To avoid the unwanted drama of being left fog bound on the ground back in Canberra, mid-winter exits are best done by coach to Sydney. However, this year that would have caused serious issues when crossing the border into Queensland so I had to take a chance on the weather being kind. And more by good luck than good management, it was. In fact, all outwards bound flights went without a hitch which has never happened before.

Past experience suggests that it's foolhardy to attempt the entire journey from Canberra to Weipa in only one day. No matter what the airline schedule says is possible, the slightest change can cascade into serious delays as I was to discover on the return journey when the unannounced cancellation by QantAss of a connecting flight left me picking up the tab for an overnight stay in Cairns.

At the airport the following morning I met up with my fellow FNQ fishos and together we continued the journey West to Weipa. From there we drove 90Km by chartered mini-bus to Cullen Point Beach (Mapoon), traversing blacktop and well-formed gravel roads; a comfortable trip of about 1.5 hours, or 3 cans in the local lingo.



This year's 6-pack o' punters consisted of a father/son combo (Ralph & Nick, originally from Europe) who fished together all week, plus myself and 3 other solo punters – Will from Sydney, Wayne from Tasmania, and Matt from regional Victoria who arrived a day late due to the airline chaos. We 4 "solos" buddied up in various combinations across the 6 days wrangled by 3 FNQ savvy guides (Dave Bradley, Amos Mapelston and Rodney Collings).



When fishing Far North Queensland well seasoned saltwater fishos eventually come to expect, if not accept with good grace, they'll eventually get dealt the tricky combination of major spring tides, windy weather and cloudy skies. For example, on many days it was too windy to head off-shore except first thing in the morning, which then meant missing the birds, bait balls and hungry Tuna which tend to arrive only after the day has warmed up a bit.

And having been pushed in-shore seeking shelter from the wind (and Sharks!), come mid-morning the tropical clouds would start to form so it was often too overcast for sight fishing the flats, except for brief moments of great promise and anticipation.

However, this year we were dealt a full house of unusual weather events ranging from a few rounds of drenching tropical rain to the wild card of unseasonal wind direction creating washing-machine seas with wind against tide against waves.

This severely limited access to the other Western rivers (Cotterell, Macdonald, Skardon), and also made for one or two nervous bar crossings. Naturally this presented no problem for cool hand Amos who'd earned his nautical stripes at the Noosa bar (river mouth not the Noosa Reef Hotel, or so he claims).

No matter what the weather, the other certainty was the ever present Sharks plus some other toothy critters, all of which were ready, willing and able to neatly snip fly from leader or smash a 1m fish to pieces. This trip was definitely no exception with several sessions cut short (pun intended) by Sharks ganging up in near-shore locations well suited to Tuna & Trevally, or the shallow coral bommies which are dredged with fast sink lines for any number of red reef species.

Over the last few years it seems the Sharks have not only got bigger & bolder, but gradually extended their range to include shallower waters. Thankfully they've not yet moved into the extensive highly tidal estuarine systems. This is a major blessing since these waters are the last refuge when near-shore flats and off-shore shallow reefs are otherwise inaccessible due to adverse wind, rain, rips, tide, waves, and/or cloud.

And the Mackerel also proved quite troublesome such that a 6" wire trace was standard survival tactics to keep a fly in play for longer than a few seconds. This can quickly start to add up, but not so much the cost but rather how many more white clouser flies could I afford to sacrifice to fish which will never be boated – not even for a quick happy snap (or an unhappy snap if the Mack had its way with your fingers!).

Hits and misses aside, there was always enough promise in the air and fish in the water to keep us all flogging away from 8 to 5 every day, with one hour of R&R for lunch and a refreshing ale.



Despite running the full gauntlet of challenges I did manage to card my first Giant Herring (GH) about which I was pretty darn chuffed, and also a largish Cobia which is only my 2nd on fly (unmeasured, but I'm calling it a metre lip-to-tip).



Other notable captures included an Archerfish (also my 2nd on fly), and what has now become my must-catch FNQ "motto species" (the Remora). That's now 4 in 4 trips, so quite some pressure to perform.



And then there's that iconic tropical species, the Mud-skipper, which apparently are a prime target for bored fly fishos when the Barra aren't cooperating. These jaunty little critters are both fun & challenging and I can assure you none were harmed or even hooked since fly-in-mouth even if quickly spat out counts as a catch. Another first included a rather special 10cm Chocolate Cod, which at 30+ years was arguably the oldest fish caught on this trip.

A rare capture which momentarily elevate me to hero status was a "Harry Hotlips" (aka *Plectorhinchus gibbosus*) – but variously known as Black Sweetlip, Blubber-lip Bream, Brown Blubber-lips, Brown Sweet-lips, Dusky Sweetlips, Hairy Hotlips, Rubber-lip Bream, Silver Grunt, Silver Javelin, or just a plain old Brown Bastard!





Two Harrys were caught however this is quite unusual since most times they remain unseen. To be honest, mine was purely a by-catch when blind casting for small Queenies (or was it Barra?) – however the other was deliberately sight cast to by a far more experience fly-fisho than I ... as in, jigged on fly from right under the boat.

I've now caught both Grey and Brown Bastards, so all that awaits is the more illusive and highly prized Blue (similar fish but with a blue rinse and which is now recognised as a unique species).

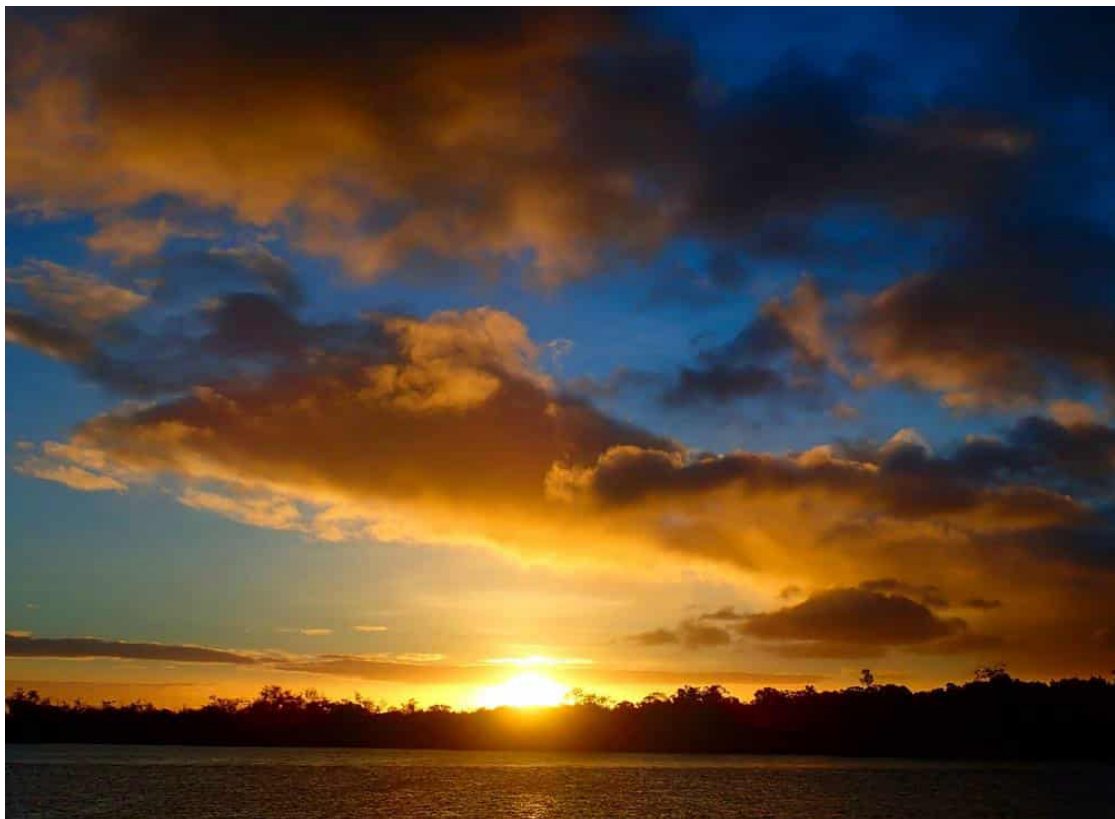
This year's other notable (but not entirely unexpected) absentees from the species list included the highly prized Milkfish, Blue & Threadfin Salmon, and others such as Longtom, Tuskfish, Grassy Sweetlip, and even the humble Catfish.

And there also seemed to be less of the bread'n'butter species like packs of near-shore Tuna (Longtail & Mack), arm-stretching Trevally on the flats and river mouths (Giant, Golden, Brassy & Bludger), and swarms of rat Barra & Jacks hugging the snags and drains.

Whether this was due to localised weather conditions, a growing population of Sharks, or the creeping impact of climate change and fishing pressure, it's hard to say.

But I'll now have to wait until next year to find out. I may even spend a week or two in Weipa focusing on all the species which aren't readily available in the Western River area of The Cape ... though that probably means I'll need to set aside a month or more!

While every day was filled with hits & misses, come sun down there was always someone's exceptional capture to celebrate. It is, after-all, about the story telling and accumulation of individual and collective memories.

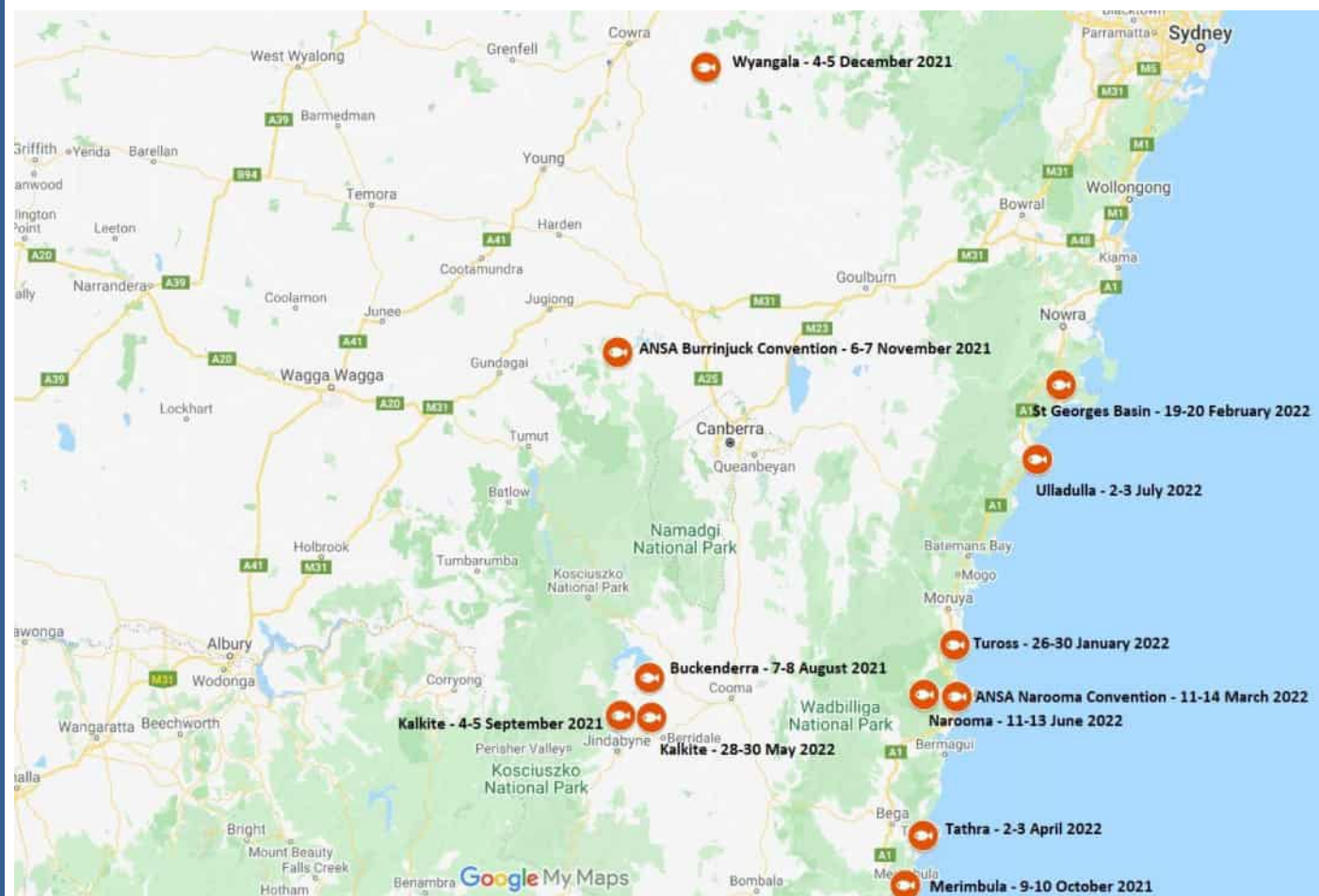
